ABOUT CONSERVING CAROLINA'S SUMMER OF SERVICE PROGRAM

A project of Conserving Carolina's AmeriCorps Project Conserve, the Summer of Service program is gearing up for another cycle in 2024. Summer of Service is a young adult development initiative designed to engage 17-21 year olds interested in trying something new and learning more about one-self and the environmental fields of study and work. Participants work as a team to develop leadership, life, and work skills through hands-on service projects throughout the summer.

SERVICE PROGRAM DETAILS 2024

The program runs from June 17 - July 26, 2024. Participants will serve 18 hours per week - incorporating training and skills development activities in addition to direct outdoor service. Participants will commit to the completion of at least 100 hours of service and will receive a total of a \$1,500 stipend paid in three installments. Each participant who successfully completes their service term will also receive a \$388.03 education award that can be used to pursue higher education.

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Summer of Service Outcomes

In its pilot year, 2017, the Summer of Service program successfully engaged and immersed five high school-aged youth in 3,000 hours of service over the course of ten weeks. Crew members learned important work and life skills while improving local communities and public resources. During their service term, the crew improved habitat on over 20 acres and maintained over three miles of trails. Service activities were carried out at Pisgah National Forest, Florence Nature Preserve, Hickory Nut Gorge Teaching and Research Reserve, and other public and conserved properties.

In 2023, the Summer of Service program shifted to 100 service hours over a six week period; roughly 18 hours per week. Nine high school and college-aged youth provided service throughout Henderson, Haywood, Polk, and Transylvania counties. During their term, the crew planted numerous native plants, creating important native pollinator habitat, removed litter from the land and our rivers and streams, restored native habitat by removing non-native and invasive plants, and helped to build and improve local public hiking trails.
